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INTRODUCTION

The Apostle's Creed is an ancient statement of faith that finds its origins in the 2nd century AD, as a baptismal confession of faith.

Sometime around the $6^{th} - 7^{th}$ Century AD the creed had found its current form, and millions upon millions of Christians have recited this creed to affirm their faith in the Lord Jesus, throughout the world.

Whilst the creed itself is not the inspired word of God, it highlights a number of core truths that all Christians believe. It helps protect us from heresy on a number of core truths from God's word and, if learnt by heart, can be a wonderful source of comfort and strength in the Christian journey.

As we work our way through the Apostle's Creed together, try to learn the creed by heart. Whilst wrote learning is not popular these days, having these biblical truths written on our hearts in a way we can easily recall is a great blessing as we journey with Jesus.

Starting Prayer: Pray that God would grow you in a deeper relationship with him as you dig deeper into the biblical truths of the Apostle's Creed.

For Starters: What part of God's creation most takes your breath away?

Read Psalm 33

- 1. How does this psalm describe God's relationship to his creation?
- 2. What are the implications of God being the creator of heaven and earth, as opposed to the universe just springing into being of its own accord?
- 3. In the time the Apostle's Creed was formulated, one of the dominant worldviews was Gnosticism which was marked by a denial of created things and a view that the only good things were 'spiritual' not 'material'. What does the concept that God is the creator of heaven and earth say to that?
- 4. If God really is all-powerful, how should we respond to him?

5. Why do you think it's significant that God created the universe by his word, and not some other way?
Read Matthew 6:5-14
6. Since God is not 'male' why does he reveal himself as 'father'? What does it mean for him to be 'father'?
7. How should the knowledge that God as father shape our self- understanding and our prayers?
8. What causes people to doubt that God is a loving father, and how would you respond to those doubts?
9. How does someone become a child of the heavenly father?
10. How do the concepts of God as both 'father' and 'creator' relate to each other?

3. What key things do we learn about Jesus in these verses?

4.	What does Jesus' pre-existence (v.1-3) tell us about the importance of the incarnation (Jesus taking on human form)?
5.	How has the world responded to Jesus' coming?
6.	What do verses 12-13 reveal about Jesus' purpose in coming into the world?
Read	Galatians 4:1-7
	Why was it necessary for Jesus to be born as one of us?
8.	How does Jesus' coming into the world lead to our adoption to sonship?
9.	What does verse 6 teach us about the nature of God?
	According to verse 10, what does faith in Jesus make us and what benefits / blessings do we gain?

Read Romans 3:19-26 7. What do we learn in these verses about the common state of humanity before God?
8. How can we be "declared righteous" before God?
9. What does it mean that Jesus is a "sacrifice of atonement"?
10. Why did God send Jesus to die in our place and for our sake? Consider especially verses 25-26.

1. What happened to Jesus between Good Friday and Easter Sunday?

Read 1 Cor 15:1-28

- 2. What stands out to you from this passage?
- 3. Is anything unclear or confusing to you in this passage?
- 4. The New Testament Scholar, N. T. Wright, speaking of the shocking claim of the resurrection of Jesus in the ancient world said: "Christianity was born into a world where its central claim was known to be false. Many believed that the dead were non-existent; outside Judaism, nobody believed in resurrection." So, what does resurrection mean, and how is it different from alternative views of what happens after death?

5. Why is the resurrection of Jesus from the dead so important for the Christian faith?
6. Some more modern readers have said that Jesus didn't literally rise from the dead, rather he 'rose in the hearts of his disciples'. How would you respond to this?
7. What does the resurrection of Jesus mean for us and for the whole creation?
8. What would you say to someone who finds it hard to accept the truth of Jesus' resurrection?
Read 1 Cor 15:29-32 9. To what extent does the truth of Jesus' resurrection drive Paul's mission?
10. To what extent are you animated by the hope of the resurrection?

he descended to the dead.

On the third day he rose from the dead; he ascended into heaven, and is seated at the right hand of the Father; from there he will come to judge the living and the dead.
